

Minutes of a Meeting of FULBOURN PARISH COUNCIL held in The Fulbourn Centre, Home End, Fulbourn on Wednesday, 14th September 2011.

Present: Councillor Patten (Chairman) and Councillors Bullen, Dawson, Drage, Farmer, Hardwick, Lacey, Lockwood, Mair, Newell, Scarr (and District), Stalley, Ward, Webdale and Williams (and District) and the Clerk. Messrs McLean, Townley and Ward.

Public & Press - You are invited to attend the whole meeting and are welcome to speak at our Open Forum at the beginning of the meeting. There were no questions from the floor.

56. To accept apologies for absence.

County Councillor Clarke – family bereavement.

57. To notify the clerk of any declarations of interest that will be declared by members for any item to be discussed.

Councillors Hardwick, Mair, Ward and Webdale did not vote on Item 59.

Cllrs Drage and Newell – Personal Item 68.1

58. Justin Bainton from January's – proposed re-location of Kids Unlimited.

Colin Brown from January's attended in place of Mr Bainton accompanied by Jeremy Clark and Kim Lawrence from Kids Unlimited and Jonathan Roe of PRC Architects. Mr Brown said due to re-development of the Ida Darwin site, it was necessary to re-locate the nursery. They intend to move to the Capital Park site at Fulbourn Hospital. This is a designated site in the Green Belt, and as the application will be submitted under PPG2, they have to demonstrate the circumstances to justify development in the Green Belt.

Mr Clark said the nursery opened in 2000 working with Addenbrookes Hospital initially to look after members of staff's children. They now employ 33 staff, the majority full time and most of the staff and children attending live in Fulbourn and Cherryhinton. They have been looking for sites within a half mile radius. Their current lease with the health authority has a break clause. Mr Roe showed the proposed site which is flat and without any trees. The proposed building would be of high quality, single storey – examples of recent builds were shown – and would tuck into the landscape. Mr Brown concluded that he hoped Council had found the presentation useful and would consider it as a valuable local facility. Council raised parking concerns which will be considered before the final planning application is submitted.

59. Fulbourn Community Project Phase II – Business Plan.

Standing Orders were suspended. Messrs Townley and Ward were asked how the building would be run and managed when finished. Council was told the Trust would have overall responsibility but considered the Parish Council and Institute partners. Initially the day-to-day running would be manned by volunteers and they would employ cleaners. The Trust appreciates eventually it could not rely on volunteers and would keep this monitored. When asked about bookings, Janice Brown will continue as this was just an extra room. Mr Ward said the Trust was a charity and needed to fund the project prudently adding he felt The Trust had brought value to the village with free professional resources and its building team. The Trust was asked to consider providing a rent free office for life for the Parish Council, and Cllr Hardwick hoped the funding shortfall could be found without coming back to the Council. The Parish Council would not release any money until the project was fully funded. Standing Orders were resumed. Cllr Drage proposed, seconded by Cllr Farmer that Council accepts the Business Plan. With 9 votes in favour, the motion was carried. The grant to Phase II would now total £150,000 – precepted and already committed amount of £50,000 and £100,000 from Section 106 monies.

60. Post Office update.

Cllrs Patten and Webdale met Ms Newey from Post Office Ltd this morning with a lady interested in running an Outreach Service at The Swift's subject to a survey of the site by a Post

Office engineer. If approved, the service would run for a maximum of 12 hours per week which would include one morning and two afternoons. Post Office Ltd would need their own designated telephone line and the Parish Council would have to provide a lockable cabinet. An agreement would need to be drawn up with either party able to give three-months notice to terminate the contract. Cllr Webdale proposed Council proceeds with the necessary arrangements, seconded by Cllr Ward and agreed by Council.

61. Recreation Ground – Entrance and Widening Road.

As enquiries continue, it was agreed to refer this item to the October meeting.

62. Report of Meeting at Cemetery Entrance.

Three Councillors met residents of Sanders Lane following a proposal from a resident who wished to straighten a shared access that would need the cemetery barrier to be moved back 6 feet. Mr Watney intends to erect a picket fence across his entrance to ensure the safety of his grandchildren and thought his proposal of the access would make it easier for his neighbours. Following this meeting and with concerns as to privacy and vehicles using the entrance to turn around, Mr Watney intends just to erect the fence at present.

63. Pavilion Clock Service Agreement Renewal.

This is a specialist clock much used by visitors to the recreation ground. Cllr Stalley proposed accepting the three-year service agreement, seconded by Cllr Bullen and agreed by Council.

64. Queen's Diamond Jubilee.

Cllr Hardwick advised The Feast Committee had decided to hold a Street Party on Sunday, 3rd June 2012 in The High Street providing free refreshments to children up to 16 years of age. Other entertainment was being arranged and also possibly a competition for the best decorated house. Cllr Drage felt at a recent Communications Committee meeting that the Parish Council should be involved, so it was agreed to ask The Feast Committee to invite the Council to its next meeting which will be the AGM in October.

65. Request for WIFI at The Fulbourn Centre.

Council had previously agreed a similar request from the Institute in April 2010 providing the WIFI was secure. The wireless router needs to be installed from a BT line, so enquiries will be made as the Parish Office has the only line at The Centre. It would be a one off expense that could be shared by The Centre and Institute.

66. To approve the minutes of the last meeting.

The Minutes were approved and signed by the Chairman.

67. Matters arising from the last meeting.

67.1 Public Planning Meeting. SCDC Planners will attend a meeting on 2nd November 2011 to explain the current framework as suggested at the July meeting of Council.

67.2 Greater Foxes. Residents will be notified that the Limes Trees near the entrance are to be felled as previously agreed now the replacement Hornbeams are established.

67.3 Tree works. The SCDC will be asked to visit various sites around the village for advice.

68. Correspondence.

68.1 Football Club request improvements at the Recreation Ground. Owners of the hedge on the western boundary they want cut back will be contacted; Council need to know details of equipment stored by the Football and Cricket Clubs and whether it is in either the container or garage before considering repositioning the container; A site meeting with other clubs will be arranged regarding the internal state of the pavilion. Meeting arranged for Saturday, 15th October at 9.00am.

68.2 **SCDC** – Grounds Maintenance Contract of SCDC land including shrubs and trees if ending in 2013 and Parish Council being approached to undertake the work themselves. Work to include grassed areas, hedges and shrubs but not trees. If taken on, SCDC would disaggregate the budget and award a proportion of money to cover ground maintenance works within our parish. This will be referred to the Finance Committee.

- 68.3 **CCC & Peterborough City Council** – have jointly prepared a Minerals and Waste Plan vital in ensuring that construction materials are available to support planned growth in the region. Also that sustainable waste management is in place for existing and planned new communities. Also a Draft Supplementary Planning Document.
- 68.4 Master Plans for Fulbourn and Ida Darwin Hospital Sites – A Public Exhibition presenting the Master Plans to be held at Fulbourn Hospital in September. January's to be asked if a date has been arranged.
- 68.5 **Stagecoach** – Response to our letter re. fire damage to the litter bin in Hinton Road.
- 68.6 **Co-operative Group** – Area Committee due to meet 8th September 2011 and our comments about having a Post Office in the village will be raised.
- 68.7 **CCC** – Preparation for the Winter Season 2011/12. Grit bins available at reduced costs; information on liability and on formal treatment of public highway.

- 68.14 **CCC** – Will no longer be cutting any verges in the parish. At Present they do 3 cuts per season. If we wish to undertake the management of the protected road verges, we need to contact the county's Ecology Officer. Referred to the Finance Committee.
- 68.15 **CCC** – Having to prioritise highway and traffic management due to funding. Asking if parking restrictions in The High Street is still considered a priority and if we would be prepared to contribute £1.00 per person listed on the electoral register up to a maximum of 25% of the total cost of the scheme. Referred to Finance Committee.
- The High Street has been re-surfaced and the contractors to be congratulated, but we need to enquire why road markings are missing from outside The Six Bells.
- 68.16 **Accent Nene** – To date no response from land owners regarding the possibility of land for possible affordable rural exception sites.
- 68.17 **Friends of the Roman Road and Fleam Dyke** – Annual accounts and newsletter.
- 68.18 **CCC** – Details of funding sources should the Parish Council wish to commemorate trees or fruit hedges to mark the Diamond Jubilee.
- 68.19 **SCDC** – Parish Training and Information Sessions regarding Planning. (Tues 11th Oct; Tues 18th Oct & Tues 25th Oct) 17.00 – 19.00. Up to 3 representatives permitted.
- 68.20 **P Skulskyj** – Request to ask SCDC to carry out tree works in Fromont Close. We have been asked before, but unless any work is deemed an emergency, SCDC do not have the budget for non-essential works.

Parish Council report from Leader of the County Council Nick Clarke

SUPER FAST BROADBAND

Approval from cabinet to set a prudential borrowing headroom of £20m was agreed in august. This has had universal approval from the public and other organisations. Since then we have had agreement, from all districts with the exception of Cambridge City, to divert £4m of what was LPSA money to this project. We have also been awarded £6.75m of BDUK (government) money for the project although we believe we are entitled to more and are challenging this. On top of all this we are expecting the private sector to contribute £50m to the project which will give superfast broadband coverage to 90% of the county. We see this as a huge benefit for business development and as important as electricity or roads.

CHESTERTON STATION.

I hosted lunch for Theresa Villiers, the rail minister, at which we were able to explain the merits of the proposed new station. She was enthusiastic about it. The business case shows that if we build it the £21m cost is likely to be repaid in 6 -7 years as long as the rail franchise agreements that are being relet in 2013, 2014 and 2018 include the requirement for this station.

CAMBRIDGE AIRPORT

I attended a meeting with the Director General for Civil Aviation, the MD of Stansted, and Robert Marshall from Cambridge airport amongst others. In the south east passenger numbers are down, aircraft efficiency is up, noise is down and Cambridge airport want to focus on the executive jet market. This will help build on the theme that Cambridgeshire is open for business.

HEALTH AND WELLBEING BOARDS

I have been working to agree the make up of this important board which will be a committee of the county council. We set out to try and keep the board as small as possible, so that it is effective during the initial 18-month shadow period. It can always grow later if there is a need. We have agreement across all partners including GPs, NHS, CCC and all districts except Cambridge, who have now fallen into line albeit reluctantly. This has now been approved by cabinet. This board, which I will chair, will have responsibility for a wide range of health issues. Underneath this board will be a number of “networks” to ensure effective representation from all parts of our communities.

NEW EMAIL ADDRESS FOR REPORTING STREET LIGHTING FAULTS

The Private Finance Initiative (PFI) funded partnership with Balfour Beatty will replace most of the street lighting columns in the county with improved lighting levels and reduced maintenance and replacement costs over the next 25 years. There is now, with the change of contractor, a new email address to report all street lighting faults.

EMERGING LIBRARY VISION REVEALED AS PART OF REVIEW

An emerging vision to design a twenty first century library service to suit the varied needs of communities has been unveiled by Cambridgeshire County Council. It is proposed that no community will lose access to library services but changes may be made in the way they are currently delivered. Some communities may even get better access than they currently have. Ideas such as shared services across Councils, use of volunteers, staff restructuring and self service will continue to go forward. We will also look at whether other council services and even local business or community facilities such as Post Offices could share buildings making them real community hubs. Moving to shared premises has the potential of saving the council money from its overall budget as well as joining up services and creating income. This could also give the potential of putting library services in places that currently don't have them.

LOCAL ENTERPRISE PARTNERSHIP WINS ENTERPRISE ZONE SCHEME

Part of the Alconbury Airfield site has been selected by the Government as one of the new wave of ten Enterprise Zones. The Enterprise Zone proposal for Alconbury is designed to encourage investment, attract innovative companies and create around 8,000 jobs.

The proposal, submitted by the Greater Cambridge Greater Peterborough Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP) to Government in June, put Alconbury in competition with other Local Enterprise Partnership proposals from across the country..

We will now be working in close partnership with the LEP, landowners / developers Urban & Civic, and with Huntingdonshire District Council to make this proposal become a reality.”

The Enterprise Zone will not only bring benefits for Huntingdonshire, the uplift in Business Rates income will be retained within the Local Enterprise Partnership area for 25 years, rather than this income going to the Treasury as happens today. This means millions of pounds of additional income will be available to help fund projects across the whole of the Local Enterprise Partnership area, which the Board of the LEP will agree.

It will also give 100 per cent business rate discount worth up to £275,000 over a five year period, for every business that moves into the site. Superfast broadband and simplified planning are also included.

BUZZ-INNESS IS BOOMING IN CAMBRIDGESHIRE AT NEWS OF ENTERPRISE ZONE

Cambridgeshire is seeing a real buzz in the business community says County Council Leader Nick Clarke after hearing companies are already interested in locating in the new Enterprise Zone at Alconbury.

I was able to have an extended meeting with Sir Bob Kerslake, Permanent Secretary at the Department for Communities and Local Government, about the zone's merits. He left with a very clear impression that Cambridgeshire is open for business, and that the Enterprise Zone will bring huge benefits for the whole of the Local Enterprise Partnership area.

Chief Executive Mark Lloyd and I took a fact finding tour of the Alconbury site recently. We heard from developers Urban & Civic how the business community is already looking at what benefits the newly announced zone will bring and is keen to find out more about the developer's plans.

The Enterprise Zone proposal will mean around 8,000 new jobs for workers as companies will be given incentives to set up on a 370-acre section of the Alconbury Airfield site.

PUPILS JOIN MPS IN FAIRER FUNDING CAMPAIGN

Pupils from Cambridgeshire schools will meet MPs in London in a bid to secure more funding for the county's schools. Cambridgeshire receives less Government cash per pupil than any other county in the eastern region. It receives just £4,644 per pupil, compared with £4,816 for Essex and £5,169 for Peterborough.

Cambridgeshire is ranked 143rd out of 151 local authorities for funding - down from 132nd last year. Peterborough is the 55th best-funded authority in the country. If Cambridgeshire was

funded at the national average of £5,082 per pupil, this would mean nearly £35m more for Cambridgeshire's schools - or an extra £441 per pupil.

Item 69.2**My report to the September 2011 meeting of Fulbourn Parish Council**

1. Since the July parish council meeting I attended as a district councillor a meeting of the Windmill Estate Steering Group and the full meeting of South Cambridgeshire District Council on 21 July 2011.
2. At the time of writing this report and as reported in the Cambridge News, SCDC has provisionally awarded the housing repairs contract to Mears plc a building company based in Gloucester, which mainly carries out maintenance work for social registered landlords including property in Linton. This is a controversial decision given that in 2009 the council actually voted against the tendering of the in-house housing repairs service given that it has made a profit for the housing revenue account, but this was overturned by the cabinet of the council.
3. SCDC has agreed to extend the installation of solar photovoltaic cells to all council tenants. A consultation pack is being sent to all tenants and meetings are being organised to enable tenants to meet with Savills Solar the contractor. Not all homes will be suitable, but the income received from selling the surplus electricity will be used to benefit all tenants.
4. The planning application by Tesco for a customer collection pod and canopy in the customer car park of its Fulbourn store was withdrawn the day before the planning committee met. This coincided with me providing photographic evidence that the customer collector point at Tesco Extra Romford upon which Tesco had based its evidence was not the same as that applied for. I was looking forward to taking them on! I await its revised application.
5. SCDC has yet to respond to the government's consultation on its national planning policy guidance. In my view this is a thoroughly ill thought through document which by putting the presumption in favour of development goes against the principles of the Town and Country Planning Acts and will lead to a more complicated local plan and planning process as LPAs attempt to cover every possibility to avoid litigation by developers.
6. SCDC has produced a Community Transport leaflet which has been distributed to the library, health centre and Twelve and copies of which I have given to the clerk.

FULBOURN ACTION FOR YOUTH**REPORT FOR FULBOURN PARISH COUNCIL SEPTEMBER 2011**

As you know we had to close the Club temporarily last term. This decision was taken very reluctantly and due to staffing problems resulting from the cuts in youth provision by the County Council. Unfortunately, although FA4Y had negotiated a partnership agreement with the County Youth Service and this was in place for 1 April, the Youth Workers concerned decided not to accept the conditions. This meant the Youth Club had to close temporarily in order to recruit new leaders. We now have Altab Miah in place as the Leader Youth Worker and he starts officially in September although was present for some of the summer activities which took place in August.

A support leader is currently being appointed and will be in place for 13 September.

Nikki King, Youth Work Co-ordinator for the Bottisham, Burwell & Soham Locality Team, is still our link with the Youth Service and has been very supportive to FA4Y.

Youth Club - The two youth clubs are now meeting on a Tuesday evening with the Junior Club (9-12 year olds) meeting 4.30-6.00 and the Senior Club (13-16 year olds) meeting 6.30-8.30.

FA4Y is very grateful to the money precepted by the Parish Council which has enabled us to enter into a partnership agreement with the Youth Services and keep our club running. We are applying for grants to run some projects over the year which will enable the club to be open on additional nights, possibly staffed by some of the Summer Activity Leaders and to make more use of the music studio.

Summer Activities – FA4Y were able to secure some funding from Accent Nene and the Police Southern Division BCU Fund which enable us to provide summer activities for 3 afternoons for 3 weeks in August. Altab Miah led two of the sessions that were a very good way to introduce him to young people of Fulbourn. Dennis Felix was able to come back and lead the other sessions and be present for all. We were also lucky to have Elliot Little who is studying for a further music degree at Anglia Ruskin and was able to make good use of the music studio, Millie Whittingham who is studying Illustration at Portsmouth University offered some excellent creative art activities. In addition Lawrence Maskell of All4Sports came and provided some sporting activities. Unfortunately the weather was not too kind for the sport but, hopefully, we will be able to make use of his organisation in the future.

It was good to be able to have a variety of activities taking place at the same time making good use of the Recreation Ground, Skate Park as well as the actual building.



FA4Y liaised with Accent Nene so that the summer activities took place on the same day as their Fun Day. The final day of the summer activities rounded off with various activities including face painting and a barbeque.

During the year we have obtained a High Sherriff's Award which was applied for by Dennis Felix with the help of some of the young people. The sum awarded was £450 which has enabled FA4Y to buy some tools for the young people to maintain the BMX mound and skate park.

Present – the initial agreement for FA4Y to use the old Institute Building for 5 years is now up but a meeting between the Trustees and John Brown is due to take place later this month.
