



<p>Cllr Mair asked that it be recorded he was not happy with this decision as he had wanted a pre-meeting with the preferred contractors to go through the specifications and to finalise costs. It was pointed out that he had been sent a copy of the tender twice, all contractors had been interviewed and the meetings reported to Council and Council had approved both the loan and choice of recommended contractors at the Public and December Parish Council meeting at which Cllr Mair had been present. The Minutes of the December meeting had also been approved at item 102 earlier and he had raised no objection at that time. Now that Council had made the decision, which was unanimous, Cllr Mair could not challenge this decision or ask for it to be changed at present and it should be borne in mind that all other Councillors had voted for it. assumption of a 2% Adult Social Care precept and a 0% Council Tax means our projected core spending power actually reduces by 0.8% in cash terms at a time when we are seeing spending on adult social care and children services soar. This can only mean unnecessary cuts to roads, libraries, bus subsidies etc. Overall the announcement looks set to keep Cambridgeshire– the fastest growing county in the UK – around the 3rd worst funded county council in the UK.

2. The County Council has relaunched the Supported Lodgings scheme and is looking for people with a spare room or annex who can support a young person leaving care, aged 16-21. Carers can be from a wide range of backgrounds and walks of life and an allowance of £250 per week is paid to them while they have a young person placed with them. Although the Supported Lodgings scheme requires less intensive support than other types of foster care, carers do need to be able to make time for the young people in their care and show the ability to listen and understand their needs. Carers are also required to offer advice on all aspects of independent living, such as cooking, washing and budgeting. It is a paid caring role with a fixed tax-free allowance of £10,000 per year plus an extra £250 for each person supported each week or part of a week.
3. The Police & Crime Commissioner and Chief Constable have written jointly to advise of changes proposed to policing as the current policing model is no longer sustainable and is hampering the Constabulary's ability to manage demand. Like forces across the country, Cambridgeshire faces an unprecedented workload and, as a result, officers and staff are working long hours and juggling heavy workloads. It remains committed to working to protect the most vulnerable people and targeting the most serious offenders. But this means the Police must be realistic about what they can and cannot attend, and make some difficult decisions such as not taking a proactive line on speeding. This boils down to having 50 more warranted officers but a big reduction in the number of PCSOs in our communities effective April 2018.
4. Work starts this month on the shared cycle pedestrian path along Fulbourn Road. This will involve temporary traffic lights during off peak periods for some six months.

### **District Councillor Report to Fulbourn Parish Council**

- 1 As you know consultation on the Inspector's proposed modifications the South Cambridgeshire Local Plan commenced on 5 January and closes at 5pm on Friday 16 February 2018. The consultation is only on her modifications. There are about 300 small modifications, plus some main modifications.

So far as Fulbourn is concerned the key modifications are:

- \* adopting the Liverpool 5-year housing supply method which currently gives us a supply of 5.4 years (as opposed to the Sedgefield method by South Cambs).
- \* increasing the affordable housing threshold to 11 dwellings.
- \* removing Local Green Space designation from Teversham Road. Victorian Garden is still a LGS.
- \* extending the Peterhouse Technology site over the Clock Repairers land.
- \* ensuring S106 public art provision involves the PC and the local community.
- \* strong protection for the Green Belt confirmed; policy on previously developed sites and infilling in the Green Belt re-written.

As to Fulbourn being re-designated a Minor Rural Centre the Inspector has not asked South Cambs to consult on any modifications to the village designations so by implication she is not challenging this. However the Inspector has pointed out her final conclusions will not be known until we get her report.

The timeline is now:

- \* public consultation ends 16 February.
- \* officers register all the comments and write a summary for the Inspector. I am warned that this will "take 'weeks". So March before this is given to the Inspector.
- \* the Inspector will consider the comments and either complete her report or ask for more hearings. If more hearings are not needed, the report then goes to PINS for checking.
- \* Inspector gives her final report to Council - could be May.
- \* Council adopts the amended Local Plan summer 2018.

The council legal team are looking at when the revised housing supply figure can be used as emerging policy following the public consultation.

- 2 I have met with residents and officers as part of the consultation about the future of the day rooms for St Vigor's and Chaplins Close.

With South Cambs no longer collecting paper separately when the blue bins are emptied, if you find you haven't enough room in the bin for all you recycling because of the paper the council's waste policy officer says crews are happy to collect recycling side waste providing they can see through the bag to confirm that the contents are recyclable. Basically the contents need to be checked through the bag; they will not collect recycling side waste in black or non-transparent coloured bags. Also bags that are labelled as compostable bio-degradable bin/caddy liners cause problems at the plant as they do not break down fully when processed - so crews will reject these too. If you find your single blue bin is now regularly insufficient for all you recyclables you can get a second one free of charge from the council.

- 3 I met the contractor re-instating the Cadent Gas compound on the green space in St Vigor's Road to ensure the ruts were filled too.

### Tree works in Fromont Close

The £4000 worth of tree works and landscaping in Fromont Close has begun and the contractors have made a good start. Some of the work has been delayed by storm Elena but the company have said it will be rescheduled ASAP.

### Highways Initiative

I have been given a date and time to present the Parish Council's proposal to the County Council Highways Initiative (5<sup>th</sup> February 2018 at 5pm). I will be making the case for safety measures for the corner of Station Road as discussed at previous meetings. If Parish Councillors would like to attend the meeting of course they would be welcome.

### Surveys

Both Lucy Frazer MP and myself have put together a resident survey which I have been delivering across Fulbourn. Many of these surveys have already been delivered and of course any local issues that are generated via the surveys will be shared with the Parish Council.

### Local Plan modifications

The consultation has begun which will run over the next six weeks on the proposed modifications of the draft local plans for South Cambridgeshire and Cambridge. Residents, businesses, developers and Parish Councils are all being invited to comment on the proposed modifications to the plans.

*The key modifications include:*

- *A method to calculate whether there is enough suitable land readily available in the next five years to meet the number of homes that need to be built*
- *Changing policies so affordable housing is sought on sites of more than ten homes. The Government hopes this will encourage more small developments*
- *Changes to site boundaries and policies at the proposed new town north of Waterbeach and new village at Bourn Airfield*
- *Allocation of additional employment land at the Addenbrooke's Campus*
- *A new policy to say we will begin to review the Local Plans in 2019 with a view to preparing a joint Local Plan for both Cambridge and South Cambridgeshire. This was a commitment the two councils had already made as part of the Greater Cambridge Partnership agreement with Government*
