County Councillor Report to Fulbourn Parish Council

1. The County Council's new Director of Public Health for Cambridgeshire County Council and Peterborough City Council has been announced. Jyoti Atri, currently Interim Executive Director of Public Health Wales, was the standout candidate in an extremely strong field of applicants for the post. She has previously been Director of Public Health

for Sandwell Council and has held a number of senior roles in the NHS in West Midlands, where she also completed her public health training. Prior to that, Jyoti held a number of public health research and analytical roles across London.

2. A special social media event has helped to raise awareness that rapid Covid testing is available to everyone, with messages reaching over 100,000 people. As part of both councils' work to promote rapid testing and the need for everyone to test twice weekly, a Tweetathon was held on our Twitter accounts (@CambsCC and @PeterboroughCC) on Friday 23 April. Throughout the day messages were posted focussed on rapid testing and how members of the public can access it. Messages had the hashtag #rapidtestcambs and #rapidtestpboro and highlighted how rapid testing will help everyone to stay safe and assist the planned easing of lockdown restrictions.

3. The number of children in Cambridgeshire offered a place at one of their preferred primary schools this September has increased. More were offered their first choice school – 94.5 per cent – than last year's 93.7 per cent. This year 99 per cent were offered a place at one of their three chosen schools, compared with 98.6 per cent last year. The proportion of pupils in Cambridgeshire offered a place at one of their first two choices was also up – from 97.9 per cent last year to 98.4 per cent this year. Cambridgeshire County Council received 6,420 applications for primary school places this year, compared with 6,820 in 2020.

4. A jetty that will make it easier and quicker for people to ride or walk across the city has opened as part of the flagship Chisholm Trail. The jetty, which connects the footpath between Stourbridge Common and Ditton Meadows beside the River Cam, is now available to use to allow people to walk and cycle across the common. It follows the creation of the transformational new underpass at Newmarket Road, which was delivered from start to finish in just seven days. Contractors began work on 26 March and had excavated the site in just 24 hours before laying the foundations of the 25m long underpass. A 500 tonne crane lifted 28 concrete units into place to form the underpass, before the area was refilled with 3000 tonnes of soil and material. The Newmarket Road carriageway was reinstated and reopened on 2 April.

1. Five-Year Housing Land Supply

The Greater Cambridge Shared Planning Service has now published its updated housing trajectory and five-year housing land supply position statement.

A housing trajectory is used by Councils to calculate their five-year housing land supply and also to demonstrate that anticipated housing delivery will meet or exceed their housing requirement. Our

updated Greater Cambridge housing trajectory (April 2021) concludes that Cambridge City and South Cambridgeshire jointly have 6.1 years of housing land supply for the 2021-2026 five-year period. This conclusion is based on our five-year housing land supply being calculated jointly, using the Liverpool methodology, and applying a 5% buffer.

2. Fulbourn sites

A revised Drainage Strategy has been submitted by Morris Homes, in response to the concerns raised by consultees and the community. The Environment Agency, the Lead Local Flood Authority and the Drainage Officer have been reconsulted on this.

Following on from the meeting in early March regarding design matters, it has not been possible, because of Covid restrictions, to arrange an on-site meeting which sufficient numbers could attend. Morris Homes will try to address the comments of the Fulbourn Forum as part of the application process. It has been noted that the Parish Council now supports the proposal.

Planners are aiming for submission to either the June or July committee meetings, subject to consultee comments coming back positive and the outstanding issues being resolved. Before the reserved matters application can be determined there is a need to approve the conditions under application S/0670/17/CONDA which are required to be discharged prior to the determination of reserved matters.

1066 Pianos

Following interventions from district councillors, the management of 1066 Pianos is now working with South Cambs officers – planning and environmental officers – to deal with the noise issues reported by residents of Greater Foxes

3. COVID: Covid safety and hospitality venue shelters and marquees

There has been some conversation in the media over the past couple of weeks regarding the use of shelters for use in outdoor areas at hospitality venues. Our Covid Team would like to highlight that in order to be classed as ‘outdoor’, shelters, marquees and other structures can have a roof but need to have at least 50% of the area of their walls open at all times whilst in use. No account is to be taken of openings in which there are doors, windows or other fittings that can be opened or shut. This is the same requirement that is used in the smoke-free regulations. Our Covid and Environmental Health Teams continue to support businesses to safely reopen. Over the past few weeks, our officers have been visiting areas throughout the district to undertake ‘pop-in’ visits to those who have recently reopened to see if there is any support we can provide. This has been well received. During these visits we have identified a very small number of hospitality businesses which have had structures more than 50% enclosed. Upon discussing this with the business and providing advice and guidance, these businesses have now become compliant.

Government Restart Grants open for local business applications

Businesses affected by the post-Christmas national lockdown can now apply via our website for the Government's Restart Grants.

The Restart Grants funding scheme was announced by Government on Wednesday 3 March 2021 and is designed to support businesses (including non-essential retail, leisure, personal care, sports facilities and hospitality businesses) that are predominantly reliant on delivering in-person services for the general public. Grants of up to £6,000 will be paid to non-essential retail business premises to help them to reopen safely. In addition, grants of up to £18,000 will be allocated to hospitality, accommodation, leisure, personal care and gym business premises, which may open but will be more impacted by restrictions when they do reopen.

To receive the Restart Grant businesses need to complete an online application. 4. COVID: Extra support to local businesses to help with Covid-secure measures

Our Covid & Environmental Health Teams will be working with the Health and Safety Executive (HSE) during a short term project called the 'HSE/LA Spot Check Service'. HSE are supporting Councils with checks that local businesses are managing Covid and have suitable controls in place.

The main idea is to support businesses with Covid-secure measures. For us, the focus will be on retail, hospitality, leisure, close contact services and science park-based businesses. During a four to five week period from 26 April, HSE will call or visit businesses that we have health and safety enforcement responsibility for. Those businesses who do not engage with the HSE, or where there are Covid-secure concerns, will be passed to our Covid & Environmental Health Team for follow up. This can include further engagement or, where required, use of our full range of enforcement powers.

We will be issuing a press release, posting social media messages and flagging to businesses using our channels before the Spot Checks project commences. In HSE's experience those Councils who raise awareness of the project receive greater levels of business engagement (which reduces follow up work for our officers).

Feedback from other Councils who have been part of this work highlights that the Spot Check Service is beneficial as it allows them to focus on businesses who need additional support or further encouragement to achieve Covid-secure compliance. This project will also help us focus our future work. If common issues/sectors of poor performance are identified, we can spend more time educating and working with these areas. The Business Support team have organised a free webinar next Wednesday at 1pm as part of an ongoing series supporting local business owners cope with their mental health during these difficult times. This webinar looks at how to build resilience mechanisms when your business is struggling to survive; what do business owners do to rebuild or start again?

Mental health problems are increasingly affecting people during the Coronavirus restrictions and is among the leading cause of sickness absence in the workplace. Added to the stress of keeping businesses going during the current pandemic, there are many reasons people need support;

financial insecurity, not seeing family, friends, colleagues or customers. Whatever the size of the business, everyone needs help sometimes.

5. COVID: Updates from NHS Test and Trace

Everyone in England can now access rapid testing twice a week, in line with clinical guidance. Rapid testing detects cases quickly, meaning positive cases can isolate immediately, and figures show that for every 1,000 lateral flow tests carried out, there is fewer than one false positive result.”

At times of low prevalence, the probability of a positive test result from a LFD being a false positive is higher, so we are mitigating this by asking people to confirm a positive LFD result with a PCR test: <https://www.gov.uk/government/news/government-reintroduces-confirmatory-pcr-testing>. This makes it highly unlikely that anyone would need to self-isolate unnecessarily, while ensuring that we can retain the benefits of rapid testing to detect true positive cases and for confirming when people are not infected.

Lateral flow tests identify individuals with the early stage of infectiousness and with the highest infectivity. These individuals tend to spread the virus to many people and so identifying by lateral flow tests remains important.

Recent analysis by NHS Test and Trace shows lateral flow tests (LFD) have a specificity of at least 99.9%. This means that for every 1,000 lateral flow tests carried out, there is fewer than one false positive result. <https://www.gov.uk/government/news/new-analysis-of-lateral-flow-tests-shows-specificity-of-at-least-999>

6. COVID: Pharmacy Collect

As you may be aware at the end of March the community pharmacy COVID-19 LFD distribution service (or ‘Pharmacy Collect’) was launched. This service **aims to give access to** LFD test kits at community pharmacies. Figures from earlier in the week highlighted 7,500 pharmacies had registered to provide the service. 7. COVID: Updates from MHCLG on organised events guidance for councils

The government has updated the advice for councils in England on organised events being held during the coronavirus outbreak. The guidance is designed to assist councils in ensuring that events are able to go ahead safely, in accordance with what is permitted at each step of the roadmap out of lockdown. The government also announced that, on 2 May, an outdoor gig will be hosted at Sefton Park, Liverpool, as part of the government’s Events Research Programme of pilot events.

Researchers on site will examine the movements and behaviour of the audience of 5,000 people who will not be socially distanced or required to wear face coverings in the controlled setting of the test event. Ticket holders will be required to take a rapid lateral flow test at a local testing centre prior to entry to trial the role these facilities could play in the return of large-scale events. They will also have to provide contact details for NHS Test and Trace to ensure everyone can be traced in the event of a positive test.

District Councillor Report to Parish Council May 2021

Extra support for local businesses adapting to Covid secure measures

Environmental Health teams will be working with the Health and Safety Executive to support businesses with additional Covid secure measures. From the 26th April, Health and Safety executive officers will be visiting businesses across the district including those within the Fen Ditton and Fulbourn ward, to check that Covid secure measures have been put in place. Where this hasn’t happened, officers will be advising businesses on what action needs to be taken to keep transmission rates as low as possible.

Chris Coker, South Cambridgeshire District Council’s COVID-19 Principal Officer said: “We know that being COVID-secure remains a top priority for all businesses and the vast majority of businesses are doing everything they can to operate in a COVID-secure way. It’s not been easy for

them, and we will continue to provide all the advice and support that we can. This is especially important given that so many of our local companies have gone the extra mile to continue supplying goods and services despite the challenges of the past year. Having robust COVID-19 measures in place is not only the right thing to do, but it also helps increase confidence with workers, customers and the local community.”

The focus of the project will initially be on retail, hospitality, leisure, close contact services and science park-based businesses. Chris added: “Any business in South Cambridgeshire could be chosen for spot checks which means companies of any size, in any sector can receive a visit to ensure they are COVID-secure. By making sure that businesses have measures in place to manage the risks, both our health and the economy benefit.”

Businesses who do not engage with the HSE, or where there are COVID-secure concerns, will be passed to the District Council’s COVID and Environmental Health teams for follow up. This can include further engagement via advice and support to ensure the correct measures are in place or, where needed, enforcement action being taken.

Greater Cambridge continues to grow and recruit highly skilled jobs despite the pandemic

Preliminary research into the early stages of the 2020 lockdown suggests that Greater Cambridge continued to grow at a significant rate despite the effects of Covid-19. Academic and knowledge intensive sectors such as life sciences and IT showed huge resilience and continued to expand during the early months of the pandemic. The growth was slower than 2019 but still demonstrates how resilient this area is for science and tech jobs in this area.

Some of the key findings include:

- Employment in Greater Cambridge continued to grow in 2019-20, despite the onset of the pandemic
- While employment growth slowed to 2.3% from 4.7% one year earlier, researchers note that this remains “a significant rate of growth considering the unprecedented challenges brought about by Covid-19”;
- There was a notable variation in growth rates across industry sectors and firm sizes. Particularly, employment growth in knowledge intensive sectors (5.4%) has been considerably faster and more resilient than in non-knowledge intensive sectors (0.9%);
- The fastest growing sectors in Greater Cambridge in the period were “life science and healthcare” (12%), “transport and travel” (5.9%) and “IT and telecoms” (5.2%);
- The largest falls in employment were found in “other services” (-2%), which includes hospitality businesses;
- The research reveals the importance of the furlough scheme in holding up employment in sectors with declining sales.

Playing out events

This is something that the villages within the Fen Ditton and Fulbourn ward might want to consider.
